

#### COUNCIL OF DELEGATES

Minutes | 22 September 2017 - Vienna, Austria

#### 1. Welcome by the President

Thomas Carlsson welcomes all delegates and especially the colleagues of USA and South-Africa to the Council of Delegates in Vienna. Additionally he thanks the organisation of WKO, VHZL and its team for the nice dinner on Thursday and warm hosting within the beautiful city that is Vienna.

#### 2. Approval of the agenda

After these welcome words, President Thomas Carlsson asks whether there are items to be picked up which are not on the agenda an adds an item himself in n°18 'Any other business'. The PCC group would like approval of the Council to have some extra provision for this year, according to information received yesterday that Evelyne Schellekens is leaving AIE and on decisions to be taken. Hereafter, the agenda CD 17-01 is approved.

#### 3. Verification of the registration of delegates

Before starting the meeting, the President then asks the number of registered member associations present at the meeting who thus have the voting right. The Netherlands are missing so this means that out of 13 full members, 12 members (12 full votes) are present.

#### 4. Nomination of scrutinizers

The President asks for volunteers to scrutinize the voting. Christian Atzmüller (BEAK) and Jan Siezing (EIO/Installatörsföretagen) both raise their hand and are approved by the delegates as scrutinizers. The President thanks them for their availability.

#### 5. Approval of the minutes of last Council of Delegates 2016

The President goes through the minutes of the Council of Delegates 2016 page by page and asks whether this is a correct record of the meeting. As there are no remarks or comments, the minutes CD/16-12 are approved.

#### 6. Report of the President

Mr. Thomas Carlsson had prepared some issues for his report on the fee model (contributions) and the value of being a member and a possible cost reduction to work together with another organisation. But seen the information given yesterday at the Strategic Forum, the decision was taken to firstly work within a special work group to see what would work for the future or which possible cooperation can be made. It would be too soon now to talk about cost reduction without knowing how we will proceed. So Mr Thomas Carlsson decides to come back to the members later on, when the working group has done its job. He adds that Sweden, even as a small country, is happy to be member of AIE and stating that they get good value for very little money. He insists on raising the budget in the future for this secretariat, if AIE wants to be able to continue the good work and he hopes that everyone can understand this point of view.

AIF - the EU association of electrical contractors - welcomes the obligation established Energy Performance of Buildings Directive to equip new and renovated buildings with el conduits and charging points.

The benefits of electromobility are not just limited to health and environment: the entire will gain from the growth of electromobility. In the electrical contracting sector alone installation and maintenance of electric vehicle infrastructure is making the electrician attractive for young and talented professionals, leading to the creation of thousands of

The EU is encouraging EV infrastructure deployment via several initiatives, addressing bot charging stations and private, mostly slow, charging equipment.

#### Editorial: The new EPBD - what is it and what does it mean for electrical contractors?

A few weeks ago, the European Parliament and the Council began to put together the final pieces of the puzzle that is the Clean Energy Package by pushing through one of the key pillars of the package - the new Energy Performance of Buildings Directive (EPBD).

As buildings make up 40% of Europe's energy consumption, this directive will be essential to make buildings more energy efficient and fulfil Europe's decarbonisation goals. The EU has therefore applauded the relatively smooth adaptation of the directive as a major win to simultaneously boost the construction sector, protect the environment and ensure the well-being of consumers







## PEF: one of the greatest Energy Task Force achievements

#### A forward looking Primary Energy Factor for a greener European Future

#### What is the Primary Energy Factor and why does it exist?

- The Primary Energy Factor (PEF) connects primary and final energy. It indicates how much primary energy is used to generate a unit of electricity or a unit of useable thermal energy.
- It allows for comparison between the primary energy consumption of products with the same functionality (e.g. heating) using different energy carriers (particularly electricity vs. fossil fuels).
- Electricity is a final energy carrier, produced from different primary energy sources like fossil fuels (gas, coal), nuclear and renewables (hydro, wind, solar).
- Currently a PEF of 2.5 is used as a "conversion factor" to express electricity consumption/savings in primary energy consumption/savings, regardless of the type of energy source used to produce it (also when the electricity comes from renewables).




The current conversion factor implies that 1 unit of electricity requires an input of 2.5 units of primary energy. This assumes all power generation in the EU to have a 40% efficiency (100 / 2.5 = 40) — even non-dispatchable renewables from which energy is harnessed without the combustion of fuel. A PEF of 2.5 is too high and does not reflect the reality of power generation.

#### The need to update the PEF to 2.0

The Commission has decided to review the PEF value and methodology in the Energy Efficiency Directive to better reflect the EU energy mix, in particular today's share of renewable energy in electricity generation and its strong increase in the near future.





14.8% of the EU's electricity generated by RES

The current PEF for electricity is acting as a barrier for the decarbonisation of the heating sector. By 2030 the EU RES share in power generation is projected to be at least 49%. A value of 2.0, to be set for 2020 (when the EED will be implemented) is appropriate and justified by the Fraunhofer Institute et. al.'s scientific methodology, prepared for the European Commission. The accelerated greening of the electricity mix justifies a frequent review of the value based on the aforementioned methodology, in order to reflect changes in reality.

The Primary Energy Factor (PEF) indicates how much primary energy is used to generate a unit of electricity or a unit of useable thermal energy

AIE has advocated for many years in favour of an EU review and update of the PEF value for electricity, considering the increasing renewable energy share in Europe's electricity generation

The EU Commission proposed recast Energy Efficiency Directive in 2016 contained 2.0 value

Lobbying organisations from the heating sector managed at the last minute before an EU Parliament vote in 2017 to amend the PEF and increase it to 2.5

In 2018 we obtained an agreement on a PEF value of 2.1

#### **Preliminary 2019 budget**

**EXPENSES** 

**INCOME** 

- Smaller budget deficit than in 2017 and 2018
- Increased fixed costs in order to invest in rebranding & communication and to collect sponsorships & extracontributions income
- Sponsorships & extracontributions income needed also to compensate for decreased income from membership fees
- Membership fees = pessimistic assumption that either reform does not go through or reform does not bring income back up to 2017 levels

#### AIE statute changes

- Change of office address (art 3)
- 2. Renaming:

Council of Delegates -> General Assembly
Policy Coordination Committee -> Board of Directors

#### **PCC Members:**

- 1. President
- 2. Vice-President
- 3. Member of Management Committee -> Director (Member of Management Committee)
- 4. Expert Financial Affairs -> Director
- 5. Expert Energy questions -> Director
- 6. Authorized person under Article 8.04 -> Director
- 3. Deletion of Article 8.04 and clarification about 3 year mandate of all Board members
- 4. Members' resignation deadline (art 5)
- 5. More stringent requirement on Board monitoring of secretariat work (art 11)
- 6. Clearer rules on registration and right to vote @ general assembly meetings (art 12.01)
- 7. Clarification that Past President AND WG Chairmen MAY be invited to Board meetings (12.03)
- 8. More general wording about situations in which board members are no longer able to fulfil their functions (14.05)
